

Halloween Safety

Saturday, October 31, 6-8 pm

- Keep costumes both creative and safe.
- Decorate costumes and bags with reflective tape or stickers and, if possible, choose light colors.
- Choose face paint and makeup whenever possible instead of masks, which can obstruct a child's vision.
- Have kids carry glow sticks or flashlights to help them see and be seen by drivers.



 When selecting a costume, make sure it is the right size to prevent trips and falls.

Drive Extra Safely on Halloween

- Slow down and be especially alert in residential neighborhoods. Children are excited on Halloween and may move in unpredictable ways.
- Take extra time to look for kids at intersections, on medians and on curbs.
- Enter and exit driveways and alleys slowly and carefully.
- Eliminate any distractions inside your car so you can concentrate on the road and your surroundings.
- Drive slowly, anticipate heavy pedestrian traffic and turn your headlights on earlier in the day to spot children from greater distances.

BACK TO SCHOOL, AHEAD FOR SUCCESS

It's 7:30 in the morning. The school bus has just stopped across the street from my room to pick up the children. Our cat rushed in to the window "meowing" and curiously trying to catch a piece of the action as children started toward the bus. Some parents have accompanied their kids as an extra safety measure.

It's back to school time after a shorter summer has just passed by..It's also a time to remember that what our kids learn at home is much more important than what they learn in school, although they both go together in providing them with good education. It's essential for parents to instill in them the great moral values and to teach them how to be good citizens who care about this great country of ours.

Know your child. Watch for alarming signs and strange behavior. Seek professional help and counseling if and when needed. Be a part of her/his activities. After all, your child is the most valuable investment of your life, so guard it with utmost care.
